Campus Ministry: Religious student organizations (denominational or nondenominational) devoted to fostering religious life on college *Career and placement services: A range of services, including (often) the following: coordination of visits of employers to campus; aptitude Carnegie units: One year of study or the equivalent in a secondary school subject.

Certificate: See Postsecondary award, certificate, or diploma.

Class rank: The relative numerical position of a student in his or her graduating class, calculated by the high school on the basis of grade-College-preparatory program: Courses in academic subjects (English, history and social studies, foreign languages, mathematics, science, Common Application: The standard application form distributed by the National Association of Secondary School Principals for a large *Community service program: Referral center for students wishing to perform volunteer work in the community or participate in volunteer Commuter: A student who lives off campus in housing that is not owned by, operated by, or affiliated with the college. This category includes Comprehensive transition and postsecondary program for students with intellectual disabilities: Programs designed to support **Clock hour:** A unit of measure that represents an hour of scheduled instruction given to students. Also referred to as contact hour. Continuous basis (for program enrollment): A calendar system classification that is used by institutions that enroll students at any time Cooperative education program: A program that provides for alternate class attendance and employment in business, industry, or Cooperative housing: College-owned, -operated, or -affiliated housing in which students share food and housing expenses and participate in *Counseling service: Activities designed to assist students in making plans and decisions related to their education, career, or personal Credit: Recognition of attendance or performance in an instructional activity (course or program) that can be applied by a recipient toward the Credit course: A course that, if successfully completed, can be applied toward the number of courses required for achieving a degree, Credit hour: A unit of measure representing an hour (50 minutes) of instruction over a 15-week period in a semester or trimester system or a Cross-registration: A system whereby students enrolled at one institution may take courses at another institution without having to apply to Deferred admission: The practice of permitting admitted students to postpone enrollment, usually for a period of one academic term or one Degree: An award conferred by a college, university, or other postsecondary education institution as official recognition for the successful Degree-seeking students: Students enrolled in courses for credit who are recognized by the institution as seeking a degree or recognized Differs by program (calendar system): A calendar system classification that is used by institutions that have occupational/vocational Diploma: See Postsecondary award, certificate, or diploma.

Distance learning: An option for earning course credit at off-campus locations via cable television, internet, satellite classes, videotapes, **Doctor's degree-research/scholarship:** A Ph.D. or other doctor's degree that requires advanced work beyond the master's level, including **Doctor's degree-professional practice:** A doctor's degree that is conferred upon completion of a program providing the knowledge and **Doctor's degree-other:** A doctor's degree that does not meet the definition of a doctor's degree - research/scholarship or a doctor's degree - **Double major:** Program in which students may complete two undergraduate programs of study simultaneously.

Dual enrollment: A program through which high school students may enroll in college courses while still enrolled in high school. Students are **Early action plan:** An admission plan that allows students to apply and be notified of an admission decision well in advance of the regular **Early admission:** A policy under which students who have not completed high school are admitted and enroll full time in college, usually after **Early decision plan:** A plan that permits students to apply and be notified of an admission decision (and financial aid offer if applicable) well **English as a Second Language (ESL):** A course of study designed specifically for students whose native language is not English. **Exchange student program-domestic:** Any arrangement between a student and a college that permits study for a semester or more at

External degree program: A program of study in which students earn credits toward a degree through independent study, college courses, Extracurricular activities (as admission factor): Special consideration in the admissions process given for participation in both school and First-time student: A student attending any institution for the first time at the level enrolled. Includes students enrolled in the fall term who First-time, first-year student: A student attending any institution for the first time at the undergraduate level. Includes students enrolled in First-year student: A student who has completed less than the equivalent of 1 full year of undergraduate work; that is, less than 30 semester *New student orientation: Orientation addressing the academic, social, emotional, and intellectual issues involved in beginning college. May Full-time student (undergraduate): A student enrolled for 12 or more semester credits, 12 or more quarter credits, or 24 or more clock Geographical residence (as admission factor): Special consideration in the admission process given to students from a particular region, Grade-point average (academic high school GPA): The sum of grade points a student has earned in secondary school divided by the Graduate student: A student who holds a bachelor's or equivalent, and is taking courses at the post-baccalaureate level.

*Health services: Free or low cost on-campus primary and preventive health care available to students.

High school diploma or recognized equivalent: A document certifying the successful completion of a prescribed secondary school program Hispanic or Latino: A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of Honors program: Any special program for very able students offering the opportunity for educational enrichment, independent study, Independent study: Academic work chosen or designed by the student with the approval of the department concerned, under an instructor's In-state tuition: The tuition charged by institutions to those students who meet the state's or institution's residency requirements. International student: See Nonresident.

International student group: Student groups that facilitate cultural dialogue, support a diverse campus, assist international students in Internship: Any short-term, supervised work experience usually related to a student's major field, for which the student earns academic *Learning center: Center offering assistance through tutors, workshops, computer programs, or audiovisual equipment in reading, writing, *Legal services: Free or low cost legal advice for a range of issues (personal and other).

Liberal arts/career combination: Program in which a student earns undergraduate degrees in two separate fields, one in a liberal arts major Living learning community: Residential programs that allow students to interact with students who share common interests. In addition to Master's degree: An award that requires the successful completion of a program of study of generally one or two full-time equivalent Minority affiliation (as admission factor): Special consideration in the admission process for members of designated racial/ethnic minority *Minority student center: Center with programs, activities, and/or services intended to enhance the college experience of students of color. Model United Nations: A simulation activity focusing on conflict resolution, globalization, and diplomacy. Assuming roles as foreign Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Nonresident: A person who is not a citizen or national of the United States and who is in this country on a visa or temporary basis and does *On-campus day care: Licensed day care for students' children (usually age 3 and up); usually for a fee.

Open admission: Admission policy under which virtually all secondary school graduates or students with GED equivalency diplomas are Other expenses (costs): Include average costs for clothing, laundry, entertainment, medical (if not a required fee), and furnishings. Out-of-state tuition: The tuition charged by institutions to those students who do not meet the institution's or state's residency requirements. Part-time student (undergraduate): A student enrolled for fewer than 12 credits per semester or quarter, or fewer than 24 clock hours a Permanent Resident or other eligible non-citizen: A person who is not a citizen or national of the United States and who has been *Personal counseling: One-on-one or group counseling with trained professionals for students who want to explore personal, educational, or Post-baccalaureate certificate: An award that requires completion of an organized program of study requiring 18 credit hours beyond the Post-master's certificate: An award that requires completion of an organized program of study of 24 credit hours beyond the master's Postsecondary award, certificate, or diploma: Includes the following three IPEDS definitions for postsecondary awards, certificates, and Less Than 1 Academic Year: Requires completion of an organized program of study at the postsecondary level (below the baccalaureate At Least 1 But Less Than 2 Academic Years: Requires completion of an organized program of study at the postsecondary level (below the At Least 2 But Less Than 4 Academic Years: Requires completion of an organized program of study at the postsecondary level (below the Private institution: An educational institution controlled by a private individual(s) or by a nongovernmental agency, usually supported Private for-profit institution: A private institution in which the individual(s) or agency in control receives compensation, other than wages, Private nonprofit institution: A private institution in which the individual(s) or agency in control receives no compensation, other than wages, Proprietary institution: See Private for-profit institution.

Public institution: An educational institution whose programs and activities are operated by publicly elected or appointed school officials, and Quarter calendar system: A calendar system in which the academic year consists of three sessions called quarters of about 12 weeks each. Race/ethnicity: Category used to describe groups to which individuals belong, identify with, or belong in the eyes of the community. The Race/ethnicity unknown: Category used to classify students or employees whose race/ethnicity is not known and whom institutions are Recognized Postsecondary Credential: Includes both Title IV eligible degrees, certificates, and other recognized postsecondary credentials. Religious affiliation/commitment (as admission factor): Special consideration given in the admission process for affiliation with a certain *Religious counseling: One-on-one or group counseling with trained professionals for students who want to explore religious problems or *Developmental services: Instructional courses designed for students deficient in the general competencies necessary for a regular Required fees: Fixed sum charged to students for items not covered by tuition and required of such a large proportion of all students that the Food and housing (charges)—on campus: Assume double occupancy in institutional housing and 19 meals per week (or maximum meal Secondary school record (as admission factor): Information maintained by the secondary school that may include such things as the Semester calendar system: A calendar system that consists of two semesters during the academic year with about 16 weeks for each

Student-designed major: A program of study based on individual interests, designed with the assistance of an adviser.

Study abroad: Any arrangement by which a student completes part of the college program studying in another country. Can be at a campus *Summer session: A summer session is shorter than a regular semester and not considered part of the academic year. It is not the third Talent/ability (as admission factor): Special consideration given to students with demonstrated talent/abilities in areas of interest to the Teacher certification program: Program designed to prepare students to meet the requirements for certification as teachers in elementary, Transfer applicant: An individual who has fulfilled the institution's requirements to be considered for admission (including payment or waiving Transfer student: A student entering the institution for the first time but known to have previously attended a postsecondary institution at the Transportation (costs): Assume two round trips to student's hometown per year for students in institutional housing or daily travel to and Trimester calendar system: An academic year consisting of 3 terms of about 15 weeks each.

Tuition: Amount of money charged to students for instructional services. Tuition may be charged per term, per course, or per credit.

*Tutoring: May range from one-on-one tutoring in specific subjects to tutoring in an area such as math, reading, or writing. Most tutors are

Unit: a standard of measurement representing hours of academic instruction (e.g., semester credit, quarter credit, clock hour).

Undergraduate: A student enrolled in a four- or five-year bachelor's degree program, an associate degree program, or a vocational or

Undergraduate Research: Opportunities offered to undergraduate students to make original contributions in an academic discipline via the

*Veteran's counseling: Helps veterans and their dependents obtain benefits for their selected program and provides certifications to the

*Visually impaired: Any person whose sight loss is not correctable and is sufficiently severe as to adversely affect educational performance.

Volunteer work (as admission factor): Special consideration given to students for activity done on a volunteer basis (e.g., tutoring, hospital

Wait list: List of students who meet the admission requirements but will only be offered a place in the class if space becomes available.

Weekend college: A program that allows students to take a complete course of study and attend classes only on weekends.

White: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.

*Women's center: Center with programs, academic activities, and/or services intended to promote an understanding of the evolving roles of Work experience (as admission factor): Special consideration given to students who have been employed prior to application, whether for

FINANCIAL AID DEFINITIONS

External scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants received from outside (private) sources that students bring with them (e.g., **Financial aid applicant:** Any applicant who submits **any one of** the institutionally required financial aid applications/forms, such as the **Indebtedness:** Aggregate dollar amount borrowed through any loan program (federal, state, subsidized, unsubsidized, private, etc.; excluding **Institutional scholarships and grants:** Endowed scholarships, annual gifts and tuition funded grants for which the institution determines the **Financial need:** As determined by your institution using the federal methodology and/or your institution's own standards.

Need-based aid: College-funded or college-administered award from institutional, state, federal, or other sources for which a student must **Need-based scholarship or grant aid:** Scholarships and grants from institutional, state, federal, or other sources for which a student must **Need-based self-help aid:** Loans and jobs from institutional, state, federal, or other sources for which a student must demonstrate financial **Non-need-based scholarship or grant aid:** Scholarships and grants, gifts, or merit-based aid from institutional, state, federal, or other **Note: Suggested order of precedence for counting non-need money as need-based:**

- 1. Non-need institutional grants
- 2. Non-need tuition waivers
- 3. Non-need athletic awards
- 4. Non-need federal grants
- 5. Non-need state grants
- 6. Non-need outside grants
- 7. Non-need student loans
- 8. Non-need parent loans
- 9. Non-need work

Non-need-based self-help aid: Loans and jobs from institutional, state, or other sources for which a student need not demonstrate financial **Work study and employment**: Federal and state work study aid, and any employment packaged by your institution in financial aid awards.
